Presentation _____ Resist the Slave Mind

We are pleased to share the 2024 report of the IUAES Scientific Commissions with our global anthropological community. Developing a model for our annual reports that serves our community effectively has been a challenge, and we welcome any feedback or suggestions. The Annual Report includes tentative plans for future activities, such as proposed panels for the 2025 WAU Congress, in accordance with IUAES's established practice. The final confirmation of these activities will be reflected in next year's report, following verification and inclusion in the Conference's final program

As Leadership of the Council of Commissions, we have encountered various challenges due to our recent transformation. The merger of two separate organizations, WCCA and IUAES, led to the formation of WAU. In this new structure, our Scientific Commissions play a vital role in bringing our membership together around shared themes in our diverse field.

For this report, we have selected images from our last congress, held in Johannesburg in November 2024, to illustrate our work. The cover features one of the workshops, where the mediator is seen wearing a shirt with the phrase "Resist the Slave Mind." This expression can be interpreted in multiple ways, depending on the context. Generally, it encourages rejecting unquestioning obedience, dependency, or mental subjugation—whether imposed by societal norms, historical oppression, or personal limitations. In this context, it serves as a call to political and philosophical reflection, urging anthropologists worldwide to think critically, challenge authority when needed, and take control of their own intellectual pursuits rather than being passively shaped by external forces.

We hope this report proves to be a valuable tool for strengthening our membership and providing colleagues across disciplines with insight into our ongoing efforts.

The **IUAES** Newsletter

The International Union of Anthropological and Ethnological Sciences (IUAES) was established in 1948 under UNESCO auspices in the wake of World War II. After its first decade, news about IUAES activities was published in the news section of the journal *Current Anthropology*, which was established by the Wenner-Gren Foundation in 1959. However, after a couple of decades using this channel, the executive of the IUAES realised the need for enhanced communication channels with its constituency. In the wake of the 1973 International Congress of Anthropological and Ethnological Sciences (ICAES) in Chicago and as part of the planning for the 1978 ICAES in Delhi,



discussions were first held by the IUAES Executive Council (EC) about establishing an IUAES newsletter, primarily in order to mobilise participation from anthropologists throughout the world for the upcoming congress. However, it was actually not until 1981 that the Welsh anthropologist Eric Sunderland, one of the longest-serving IUAES secretary generals, inaugurated a regular newsletter, which he himself edited and disseminated until assuming the presidency of the IUAES. The next Secretary General, the Dutch urban anthropologist Peter Nas, expanded the newsletter's publication, as well as developing the official IUAES website as a central point of information dissemination for the IUAES.

Early issues of the newsletter are now difficult to find, as in the transition to a new IUAES website after the 18th IUAES World Congress in Florianopolis, Brazil, in 2018, the page with links to newsletters was not re-established, in part due to disagreements about the design, content, function, cost and other parameters of the new IUAES website. However, older issues of the newsletter before #56 (2000) should be available at the library of Leiden

University where, Peter Nas established an archive of IUAES materials. All newsletters from 2000 to 2023 are stored and available in the MEGA drive constructed by Noel Salazar and Junji Koizumi, though issues from 2011-2014 may not all be present due to the reconstruction of the IUAES during that period. The data from the MEGA drive are also held by the IUAES Commission on Doucmentation and thus should be more readily available for historical research on the IUAES as this commission continues its work on the construction of an IUAES online archive.

After discussions in the IUAES EC at the 2015 IUAES Intercongress at Thammasat



University in Bangkok, a new series of the newsletter was inaugurated later that year under the editorship of Subhadra Channa and Junji Koizumi, who had charge of the final designing, inclusion of photographs, and publication. The newsletter was published regularly on a semi-annual basis, with issues in March and September. As Subhadra herself recalls:

I always wrote it in a narrative framework and the first heading was always about 'Raising a Voice'. We thought the newsletter should focus on what we, as an organization, are able to achieve. We had sections that included news from the Commissions and also the news from those organizations of which IUAES was a part, like the ISC.

The newsletter passed to the editorship of Greg Acciaioli and Soumendra Patnaik with the new EC whose members took office at the 2023 IUAES-WAU World Congress in Delhi. Under their editorship, the newsletter has largely used the same format, with perhaps more emphasis given to articles on activities of the commissions due to the strengthening of the Council of Commissions, which now meets on a monthly basis. During the previous editors' tenure, the IUAES Secretary General Noel B. Salazar had introduced a column entitled "From


the desk of the Secretary-General". This tradition has continued with the opening article of each issue since 2024 being a report on activities of the IUAES EC by the current Secretary General Virginia Dominguez. However, some new features have also been added, such as an occasional series of personal histories of engagement with the IUAES, the first of which was penned by Petr Skalnik.

After the July 2025 issue, the IUAES newsletter will be merged with the WCAA newsletter into a WAU newsletter, integrating articles reporting on activities of the IUAES, WCAA and WAU itself in a single newsletter to be edited initially by Michel Bouchard and James Chen from the WCAA and Greg Acciaioli and Soumendra Patnaik from the IUAES. Besides transitioning to a new design format using templates, Mailchimp will be used to facilitate wider distribution of the newsletter to members of both WAU chambers and beyond to a wider anthropological constituency to provide a higher global profile for WAU. The editors will also endeavour to include a wider range of feature articles and other types of contributions in line with discussions and suggestions of the IUAES Council of Commissions, IUAES EC, WCAA OC, and WAUSC.




Archives on Food, Culture and Nutrition





The IUAES Portraying Religion and Health Award is a Photo contest that invites visual explorations of the multifaceted relationships between religion, spirituality, and health across geographical and cultural contexts, through a plurality of methodological, theoretical and aesthetic perspectives. We seek photo essays that capture the experiences, actors, contexts and materialities that emerge from these relationships.

Theme: The relationship between religion/spirituality and health is an expanding area of anthropological research, prompted in part by the global spread of alternative, complementary and nonconventional medicines, the aftermath of the Covid-19 pandemic, and greater public interest in the intersection of religion and health.

Various forms of collaboration, intersection, negotiation, competition and conflict between religions and spiritualities on one side and biomedicine, and alternative, complementary, non-conventional and traditional medicines on the other side continue to exist and form. Religions and spiritualities may also include not only healing rituals, but also harmful practices to oneself or the others, like collective suicide, witcheraft, ingestion of harmful substances, and extreme body practices.


The jury announced the winners on May 21, 2025:

Digital Anthropology in translation



Between December 2024 and January 2025, the IUAES Commission on Digital Anthropology held a competition to promote digital anthropology research papers originally published in languages other than English. These were shared across our various social media channels for a public vote. Kostia Lenne's paper, "The Researcher, the Escort Boy and the Client: Making and Exploiting Ambiguities on a Male-for-Male Escorting Platform" (originally in French), emerged as the winner.

His prize included a waiver of the IUAES/WAU Congress 2025 online conference fee and a professional translation of his work into English, complete with an ISBN number. The translated paper will be made accessible through the humanities department at KU Leuven under the series "Digital Anthropology in Translation (IUAES)," potentially as part of a broader translated Digital Anthropology project. Kostia Lenne will also present this paper and co-host our panel with the CoDA team at the 2025 WAU Congress.





Aging and the Life Course (CALC)

Year of establishment: 1988

This commission seeks to bring together anthropologists from across the world who have an interest in questions regarding how humans grow up and grow old. We encourage diverse approaches that bridge the bio-social divide, and that critically examine historically and culturally situated discourses of aging and the life course across diverse contexts. We actively collaborate with EASA Age and Generations Network (Agenet) and the Association of Anthropology, Gerontology and the Life Course (AAGE), providing members access to these networks, and opportunities to present their work at conferences, win student awards, and publish in academic journals. The WHO declaration of the decade of healthy ageing and the recent progress on drafting a UN Convention on the Rights of Older Persons underline the urgency and scope of global ageing, and our work aims to contribute to these developments by highlighting the heterogeneity of older persons' lived experience across the world.



Activities by the Commission during WAU Congress 2024 (South Africa)

PANELS

Eight panels were affiliated with the commission for WAU 2024 held at Johannesburg, South Africa (11th – 15th November 2024). The themes of the panels covered varied topics including public authority (with focus on the pandemic), self-governance, studying up (in context of Himalayan ecology), digital technology in context of glocalisation, debates of legitimacy in context of museum collection, decolonisation of knowledge production and decentred anthropology of inquiry with special focus on China. The panels saw both online and onsite participation with delegates from Brazil, Portugal, UK, India, Nepal, Croatia, Kingdom of East Anglia, Cuba and more. The Commission collaborated with the Commission of Pandemic and the Commission on Indigenous Knowledge and Sustainable Development for two panels.

The panel recognised that Molecular anthropology is a subdiscipline of anthropology that intersects with other subdisciplines, such as archaeology, physical anthropology, and cultural anthropology, including linguistics, human evolutionary history and population dynamics, genetic factors influencing health, disease susceptibility, and responses to treatments that contribute to personalized healthcare strategies. It advocated towards an interdisciplinary approach for an effective and holistic impact of the subdiscipline, highlighting the need for associated methodologies, and theoretical frameworks. The panel discussed ethical challenges, addressed biases, and the need to actively promote inclusivity to ensure that the benefits of molecular anthropology research are shared responsibly and ethically.

The panel focused on resistances that include a questioning of the role of the state in the process of social emancipation, of the effects of neoliberalism (the concentration of wealth, poverty, inequality and financialization) and of Western democracy, accompanied by horizontal or independent forms of organization that trigger different concepts of autonomy.

The panel reflected on the need to join critical, ecological and decolonial contributions (theoretical and empiric) in the understanding of autonomies and insurgent movements in the context of a global crisis.

This panel investigated 'polycrisis' both as a contested political term, and as a useful analytical category that draws attention to underlying causes of compounding crises and their differential effects across populations. The panel reflected on the urgent need to examine place-based experiences and on-the-ground authority dynamics in places where polycrisis has long been a chronic condition. The dialogue was to ensure that accelerating global, regional, national and local responses to diverse crises (e.g., epidemics/pandemics, environmental degradation, poverty, political violence) are not counter-productive. The endeavour was to look towards what polycrisis means for the future of democratic states and multilateral organisations promoting solutions to interlocking global challenges.

Reflecting on the historical evolution of museums, from their origins as cabinets of curiosities to their contemporary status as active educational institutions, the panel facilitated dialogue on the significance and need to reenforce legitimacy as essential knowledge repositories through museums' role in promoting inclusivity and showcasing varied viewpoints and moving beyond colonial narratives. The discussion continued into virtual exhibitions to online educational tools and democratising access to knowledge and, possible interdisciplinary collaborations in museums' future trajectory. The panel also focused on the ethical issues surrounding the acquisition and presentation of artefacts.

The session featured six speakers: Furong Wan (Changsha University of Science and Technology), Jieyu Liu (SOAS), Marta Nešković (Institute of Political Studies in Belgrade), Vesna Vučinić Nešković (University of Belgrade), Ellen R. Judd (University of Manitoba), and Tien Chen (Creative Chief at Wabuntu).



This panel explored a route toward decentring anthropology by engaging with practices of knowledge creation in China, challenging the dominance of Western perspectives. Grounded in China's distinctive intellectual traditions and contemporary innovations, the panel examined how knowledge practices are embedded in culturally specific modes of sociality and agency. Processes of social transformation in China, from land reforms to evolving family relations and rural-

urban mobility, highlight a rich landscape of locally embedded knowledge creation. Anthropology's ethnographic approach reveals these dynamic processes as instances of "knowing the world differently together" and offers tools to rethink and decentre anthropological knowledge. The panel solicited and engaged a range of knowledges in areas including agricultural land reform, water containment and flood management, landscape design, cultural heritage, family strategies, and public health and healthcare, demonstrating the potential for diverse studies to reimagine anthropological inquiry.

The panellists explored how traditional knowledge systems can be revitalized, respected, and integrated into mainstream discourse, transcending cultural and geographical boundaries, and the indispensable role of local communities in the global decolonization process. The endeavour was to transcend theoretical frameworks and offer practical pathways toward a more equitable, diverse, and inclusive global knowledge landscape.

The panel received approximately 17 paper submissions from scholars across various countries. After a thorough review process, 12 papers were shortlisted for final presentation. Ultimately, 8 research papers were presented during the panel sessions.

The panel presentation in such a relevant policy-oriented theme proved to be a significant academic and cultural milestone for the panellists. A highlight for the

participants of the panel included a visit to the renowned Cradle of Humankind Museum, which offered valuable insights into human evolutionary history. Additionally, the panel coordinators and participants had enriching interactions with several eminent anthropologists from around the world, fostering academic exchange and collaboration. The papers presented in the panel provoked fruitful interdisciplinary discussions and brought new perspectives to the understanding of ethnographic practices and socio-cultural dynamics in the Himalayan region. The insights gained through these engagements are expected to significantly contribute to the ongoing and future research initiatives within the field of Himalayan ethnography and anthropology.

SPECIAL LECTURE

Culture and Sustainability by Prof. Thomas Reuter

The Department of Anthropology University of Delhi organized a special lecture by Prof. Thomas Reuter (Co-chair of the commission) on 'Culture and Sustainability: Anthropological Perspective on the Central Challenges of the 21st Century', in collaboration with the Commission, on the 29th October 2024 (3.00 pm Seminar Room). The session was chaired by Prof. Subhadra Channa (former vice-president of IUAES) and was enriched by an interactive audience of faculty, research scholars and students of various departments of the university, and special comments from Prof. Soumendra Mohan Patnaik (Head Department of Anthropology, University of Delhi).

The Department of Anthropology University of Delhi organized a special lecture by Prof. Thomas Reuter (Co-chair of the commission) on 'Culture and Sustainability: Anthropological Perspective on the Central Challenges of the 21st Century', in collaboration with the Commission, on the 29th October 2024 (3.00 pm Seminar Room). The session was chaired by Prof. Subhadra Channa (former vice-president of IUAES) and was enriched by an interactive audience of faculty, research scholars and students of various departments of the university, and special comments from Prof. Soumendra Mohan Patnaik (Head Department of Anthropology, University of Delhi).

Prof. Reuter highlighted the irony of the fact that various phases of technological advancement have exponentially amplified the destruction of our planet, yet the global tendency for sustainability related solutions remain fixated on technology for an answer. He emphasized on the need for cultural solutions and community participation for effective action, stating the need for strong political leadership. He emphasized the role of anthropologists in calling out and taking a stand where they find a lacuna in the sociopolitical processes. He also stressed on the need to highlight and celebrate effective policies, programmes and leadership. The discussions that followed highlighted indigenous philosophies including those within the Indian culture that advocate life-principles with sustainability as its focus.

Year of establishment: 1977-1978




he International Commission on the Anthropology of Food and Nutrition (ICAF) has achieved a couple of initiatives over the last year (or the past two years but settled during 2024). First, it has established the "Igor de Garine International Award," which aims to recognize postgraduate work (master's or doctoral theses) dedicated to the anthropology of food. The Igor de Garine Prize for the best research work on food and nutrition from the fields of humanities and social sciences was created with the intention of continuing the intellectual and human legacy of the man who was the driving force behind ICAF, the French anthropologist Igor de Garine (1931-2018), a pioneer in the field of food anthropology, and a former chair of ICAF. The award includes, in addition

to the recognition, the online publication of the book in the "Alimus" collection of the UNESCO- UOC Chair in Food, Culture, and Development. On the other hand, ICAF is also pleased to publicly present its new journal: Archives on Food, Culture and Nutrition (AFOCUN), a multilingual online journal (English, Spanish, Portuguese) devoted to food from social and cultural perspectives and established in 2024. Archives on Food, Culture and Nutrition is an international journal open to multidisciplinary-interdisciplinary reflection on food, where researchers from different social and cultural fields can express their points of view about food as an essential element of human life. This journal is a peer reviewed open access published twice a year. It is supported by the International Commission on the Anthropology of Food and Nutrition (ICAF), an international network of academic researchers with a common interest in food from a social and cultural perspective.

On the other hand, the commission organized two international meetings:

1. Tourism, Food and Culture, in Lisbon, Portugal (September 2024. together with the Universidade Nova de Lisboa and the Unesco-UOC Chair on Food, Culture and Development).



he Commission on Risk and Disaster aims to advance the growing body of anthropological work on disasters and create a global community of researchers that unites members from many of the regional and international networks of disaster scholars with an interest in the anthropology of risk and disaster. All researchers and others with an interest in the anthropology of risk and disasters are welcome to join the Commission.

The Commission occupies a unique and important position within the context of other networks of anthropologists whose work focuses on risk and disaster, as many of these networks are highly regionalized in scope and/or have been traditionally dominated by western anthropology – namely the US, but also the UK and Europe. The IUAES Commission on Risk and Disaster provides an inclusive space for researchers from across the world to come together discuss and co-develop ideas around important and emerging issues in the risk and disaster research fields. With its strong focus on inclusion, it welcomes, promotes, celebrates, and brings together a range of perspectives and contributions, including perspectives from Latin America, South Africa, India, and Asia, in advancing the field of the anthropology of risk and disaster.

The work of the Commission centers upon three key objectives, each of which remain fundamental to the Commission's aims and purpose:

To promote interest in the anthropology of disasters further and wider

To expand the consciousness of the anthropological community in understanding the significance of the anthropology of risk and disaster and its issues globally and across the board in anthropology and ethnographic work.

To make the policy-practice community aware of how much anthropology can contribute to their efforts to prevent, prepare for, and respond to disasters. In 2023, an additional objective was added to address the impact that the Covid-19 pandemic posed to members of the Commission:

To enhance inclusion and work together to advance a caring and supportive global community of scholars, researchers, and practitioners with an interest in the anthropology of risk and disasters.

Anthropology is positioned at the forefront of disaster studies, with the core concept of culture, being essential for understanding risk, calamity, recovery, and resettlement. Anthropology has a fundamental role to play in reducing human suffering from disasters and climate change as the ways in which we define and respond to disasters is culturally bound. Governments and institutions tasked with responding to disasters need to ensure interventions are tailored to the specific needs and circumstances of different populations and cultural groups.

Anthropologists working in the risk and disaster field continue to chronicle the human impacts of profound loss and, in the process, document policies, institutions, and communities where anthropological insight can be applied to lessen human suffering. Recent work of Commission members to expand and promote the work that anthropologists do in the risk and disaster field demonstrates how anthropology remains fundamental for tackling the enormity of the challenges posed by increasing anthropogenic climate change, the long-term impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic, and the ongoing legacies of extractive, colonial

development. Since our previous report, the situation worldwide continues to become ever more alarming as the frequency and severity of disasters further increases, affecting larger numbers of people, overwhelming existing adaptive strategies, exacerbating human suffering, and enhancing inequalities, Recent research also reveals that the majority of Disaster Risk Reduction strategies and interventions continue to remain Western-centric and dominated by hegemonic Euro-American cultural values and that when applied in other contexts, risk further consequent crises and deepening inequalities owing to their insufficient attunement with local cultures and sources of support.

Recent work by members of the Commission has helped further demonstrate that when people's cultures and local voices and perspectives are inadequately regarded in both disaster risk reduction and disaster recovery efforts, consequent crises will continue to arise. In addition, these works have also been fundamental in highlighting the importance of aspects of local culture in facilitating effective responses to disasters and sources of support and coping. Members of the Commission have continued to publish their research widely, including in leading anthropological and interdisciplinary journals such as Human Organization and the International Journal of Disaster Risk Reduction, thus ensuring that their key messages reach the wider anthropological community and are received by members of a wider interdisciplinary disaster studies audience. Members of the Commission have also organized and presented panels at regional and international conferences and congresses, including the WAU 2024 Congress, the American Anthropological Association Annual Meeting 2024, the Society for Applied Anthropology Annual Conference, and the Latin American Association 2024 conference, where recent developments in research in the anthropology of risk and disasters were readily shared by members and where networking events and activities further helped to create and solidify a strong, supportive international community of members and linkages with anthropologists from other fields.

In this past year, our commission has also strived to enhance its social media outreach. With thanks to our intern and social media Communications Officer, Anvi Sawant, our Commission now has four social media platforms which members and those with an interest in the anthropology of risk and disaster can engage with. This has helped attract new members, facilitate the sharing of knowledge and research outputs, and encouraged the codevelopment of panel sessions and papers for the upcoming 2025 WAU Congress in Guatemala.

During 2024 and 2025, the Commission has been celebrating fifty years of risk and disaster anthropology, since its first inception as a recognized field of anthropology. Our commission includes a number of leading researchers in disaster anthropology whose efforts have been fundamental to the establishment and development of the field of the anthropology of risk and disaster over time, as well as new, early career researchers whose work will continue to shape the development of the field in years to come. The Commission celebrates achievements in disaster anthropology and the work of Commission members, while also

promoting dialogue about the direction that disaster anthropology should take going forward. At the WAU Congress 2024, the current chair of the Commission teamed up with the former chair to host a double panel focusing on *Fifty Years of Disaster Study: Changing Imperatives, Outlived Terms and New Frontiers,* and which drew multiple generations of disaster anthropologists together from diverse countries to discuss concepts that have lost their pertinence, merging dichotomies, resistant fallacies, concerns that have and have not changed, and what focuses the field should now address. The panel also discussed and celebrated recent efforts to diversify, indigenize and de-colonialize disaster anthropology and new methodological innovations for doing anthropology in an age of ongoing climate disasters and increasing precariarity.

Although the Commission on risk and disaster anthropology is relatively small compared to other commissions in terms of its membership, it is a highly active commission, attracting members from across the world, and evidencing strong, supportive, and collaborative relationships between members. Recent efforts over this past year to reach out to new, early career scholars and to attract an increasingly diverse membership have proved fruitful with the inclusion of new members from a range of countries and regions, including from Latin America and Africa. Efforts to improve our social media outreach have also been fruitful as in 2025 we will welcome five panels at the WAU Congress in Guatemala which are affiliated with our Commission. We will seek to continue to expand our membership over the next year and further improve our social media communications to enhance knowledge exchange and collaborative activity development, as well as to maintain and nurture the strength of collaborative, supportive relationships between members of the Commission.

Activities by the Commission during WAU Congress 2024 (South Africa)

The Commission on the Anthropology of Risk and Disaster hosted two panels on site at the World Anthropological Congress in 2024 in Johannesburg focusing on *Fifty Years of Disaster Study: Changing Imperatives, Outlived Terms and New Frontiers.* These sessions, convened by the current and former Commission chairs, brought together Commission members representing multiple generations of disaster anthropologists from diverse countries to discuss which concepts in disaster anthropology have now lost their pertinence, what concerns remain and what new concerns now emerge, and what focuses the field should now address. Our panel members also discussed and celebrated recent efforts to diversify, indigenize and de-colonialize disaster anthropology and new methodological innovations for doing anthropology in an age of ongoing climate disasters and increasing precariarity. New intersectionalities were also highlighted by panelists, as well as complexities regarding the meaning of "theory" itself and in actioning research within policy and practice. Presentations and discussions were well attended by Congress delegates. The audience, which included

members from a diverse range of other commissions, posed interesting questions to the panelists, thus ensuring that a lively and engaging discussion took place.

PUBLISHED WORKS OF THE COMMISSION

Our members continue to engage with us through our panels at congresses and also via calls for other international conferences and member activities, where members collectively put together panels and roundtables. Members have continued to form important research collaborations with each other to advance knowledge and understanding of experiences of crises and disaster in different contexts and to improve the application of this knowledge and understanding in disaster planning and response policy and practice interventions.

Publications have been developed between members, including those initiated by congress presentations and discussions between Commission members. Members and the Commission have also been continuing their efforts to increase diversity and inclusion and fight racism and systemic oppression through the promotion of new insights from anthropological practice and research on disasters from a wide range of contexts and perspectives. Furthermore, our members' work continues to emphasize the importance of critical approaches within disaster studies, and the level of interest in understanding the causes, experiences and impacts of compounding and cascading disasters and issues of disaster-related displacement and forced migration has continued to grow further. Issues relating to social justice, colonialism, inequality, and iniquity have increasingly been brought to the fore, highlighting the persistence of unequal power structures that create and maintain inequalities in how disasters are experienced. Other recent work has focused specifically on experiences of crises during the pandemic and on working in inter- and trans-disciplinary research teams. We have also seen growing interest amongst members about the non-human experiences of disasters and on the experiences of diasporic communities, Indigenous communities, BAME population groups, young people, older people, and people living with disabilities in disaster situations, as well as growing concern about the absence of the voices of people identifying as LGBTQ+ in official governmental disaster research, planning and response outputs. Recent discussions have also focused on terminology and its impact, alongside efforts to decolonize risk and disaster anthropology.

Other Conference and Congress Activities

In addition to the WAU congress, members of the Commission have delivered panels and presentations at numerous other international conferences during 2024, including at: the Society for Applied Anthropology Annual Conference in March in 2024 in Santa Fe, New Mexico; the American Anthropological Association Annual Meeting in Tampa, Florida in November 2024; and at conferences organized by ALA, LASA, CIESAS and EMBRA. Members of the commission remain highly involved in doing inter- and multidisciplinary research, including with Historians, Seismologists, Energy experts and Climate specialists at a global level.

Links with Other Commissions and Inter-Commission Activities

The Commission on the Anthropology of Risk and Disaster already had established links with four other commissions prior to 2024 - Tourism, Extraction, Public Policy, and Anthropology of the Environment. In the past year, new links have been established with the Commission on Visual Anthropology. This new linkage is reflected in the submission of a joint panel between members of the Commission on Risk and Disaster and members from the Commission on Visual Anthropology for the 2025 WAU conference, focusing on *Mirando el desastre: antropología visual y de la imagen en tiempos de crisis climática/ Looking at the disaster: visual and image anthropology in times of climate crisis.*

Outreach Initiatives for Expanding Membership

The Commission and its members continue to recognize the crucial importance of the field of disaster anthropology and Commission's activities, and the work of the Commission continues to be reflective of the need for anthropology in all aspects of risk and disaster scenarios throughout the world.

The Commission continues to provide a platform for increasing the number of global scholars to address risk and disaster issues in their work. The Commission increased its membership to 139 members in 2024, up from 93 members in 2023 and 75 in 2022. Membership includes scholars from Latin America, Africa, India and Asia, as well as the United States, Canada and Europe and represents scholars at all stages of the career spectrum, from very early career Masters-level graduate students through to highly renowned leading international scholars with over fifty years' experience in the field of disaster anthropology. Two-thirds of our members are early career scholars (Masters-level, Doctoral-level, Post Doctoral-Level researchers). Following the pandemic, we made a particular effort to reach out to our early career scholars to attempt to reverse some of the negative impact that occurred during the pandemic around network development opportunities for this particular cohort and which appears to have helped to increase our membership. Over this past year we have also reestablished our social media platforms to assert our online presence more intensively and which has also helped to expand our membership.

Planned activities for 2025 Inter-Commission Partnerships and Collaborations

We hope to partner with more commissions over the coming year for future activities and future Congress participation, as the focus of our commission intersects with the foci and themes of a number of other commissions. Initial conversations aimed towards developing additional future collaborations have begun with the Commission on the Anthropology of the Middle East, the Commission on the Anthropology of Pandemics, and the Commission on the Anthropology of Migration, and that it is hoped these discussions will continue, with a view to developing new inter-commission activities and outputs.

Further Expansion of our Membership

We intend to continue our efforts to increase both our membership and member participation in Commission-related activities during 2025 and beyond. We will continue our efforts to further expand and strengthen the network of members, by reaching out and

welcoming more scholars and practitioners with an interest in the anthropology of risk and disasters, especially those from the Global South, Indigenous scholars, junior scholars, and new student members.

We will also maintain our active mailing list and send out notifications of relevant conferences and meetings, as well as announcements of publications on all aspects of our topic. We will also continue improving our social media communications outreach activities.

These events aim to foster scholarly exchange and expand the impact of business anthropology across diverse cultural and organizational contexts.





The activities and publications of the Human Rights Commission

In October 2023, at the IUAES in Delhi, the Human Rights Commission members agreed to allow another Deputy Chair to support the work of the commission during the term of the Chair, and that second Deputy Chair is Prof. Ann Kingsolver, the University of Kentucky, Lexington.

The Human Rights Commission has been actively sponsoring various panels, both in-person and in hybrid formats.

At the 19th IUAES - WAU World Anthropology Congress 2023 on Marginalities, Uncertainties, and World Anthropologies: Enlivening Past and Envisioning Future, held in Delhi, The CHR sponsored two panels, Panel P023: "Women Envisioning Futures Beyond the Borders of Marginalization in Global Foreign Trade Zone Work," and a Panel Discussion on "Environment, Human Health, and Healing: The way Forward in Anthropocene."

The Human Rights Commission has collaborated with other commissions, including the Immigration Rights, Anthropology of Religion, and Global Feminism commissions, to cosponsor relevant panels. Additionally, I participated as a panelist and presenter at the 2024 Anthropology of Religion conference.

The statement on the Human Rights Commission

There was a strong turnout of new members at the congress in Delhi, and it was encouraging to see so many young people actively participating in the discussions and sponsored sessions. We voted on a statement that guided the work of our commission at that time, which was reported to the Council of Commissions after the Congress.

Considering the global war, atrocities, displacement, and dehumanization of various communities, Prof. Kingsolver and I drafted this statement, which was revised collectively and approved overwhelmingly in the commission meeting at the IUAES 2023. I have included the statement below.

"As anthropologists from many nations, we ask in the strongest terms that in all conflict zones and for those who are living in displacement or conditions of unrecognized personhood in their home regions, there be universal recognition of the fundamental human rights of all persons of any age or identity. The rights to water, food, education, health care, shelter and the right to safety from being targeted for violence as noncombatants must be recognized. We must work together transnationally to prevent – in our own and each other nations – the dehumanization that leads so readily to genocide"

This statement has been sent to global political actors who support ceasefires and work toward peace in all regions.

Planned Activities

In 2025, the main project we hope to discuss at the commission's hybrid meeting and launch later is an open-source set of resources for anthropologists teaching and learning about anthropology and human rights across languages, and to discuss the most accessible platform to use in association with the website.

The following panels at the WAU inter-congress will be affiliated with our commission:

1. Construyendo la Antropología Jurídica Militante: Co-Producción de Conocimientos con Comunidades Indígenas en Resistencia

- 2. Desaparición de Personas, Estado y Justicia: El Rol de las Ciencias Sociales en la Búsqueda y la Verdad
- 3. La Reconfiguración Política del Medio Oriente tras el Genocidio en Gaza
- 4. Law and Justice and the Overrepresentation of Indigenous Peoples in National Prisons
- 5. Necropolítica Aplicada a los Pueblos Gitanos/Roma
- 6. Rethinking Climate Change and the Anthropocene from Indigenous Perspectives on Human and Non-Human Relations

Lastly, we are planning a hybrid meeting of the commission during the inter-congress in Antigua, and the plan is to hold elections for new leadership of the commission. Given the political situation, it is untenable for the leadership of this commission to be based in the US.

There is a lot we should be doing on Human Rights besides making a statement, since there is so much happening in the world right now that is egregious. We can think about what would be helpful for our commission to do that, which might make a difference. Mobilizing young people in Delhi was great, and they are key.

Vital to the work of this commission is transnational collaboration and the participation and leadership of young people, leveraging the power of technology and social media to contest disinformation and dehumanization and provide alternative routes for people around the world to learn about human rights and work toward their being respected for ALL people.

Another roundtable will discuss international perspectives on *Traditional medicine and its interactions with the official health care systems*. Jaime García, Germán Zuluaga, Neil Andersson and Nishant Saxena will participate, and Anne Cockcroft and Iván Sarmiento will moderate.

Planned Activities for 2025

Nishant Saxena presented at the monthly meeting (February 2025) of Participatory Research at McGill (PRAM). Dr Saxena presented his work on the emic vs. etic divide in the health of tribes in India. As a researcher at the Indian Council of Medical Research – National Institute of Research in Tribal Health, he explored the intersection of medical anthropology and epidemiology in tribal health. His insights, informed by his role with the International Union of Anthropological & Ethnological Sciences (IUAES), provided a nuanced perspective on Indigenous health research.

Ivan Sarmiento presented Safe birth in cultural safety: the contribution of indigenous traditional midwifery in Mexico at the First International Symposium on Tribal Health '25. The event was organized by the Maharashtra University of Health Sciences in India on January 31, 2025.

Panel was dedicated to problems of harmonizing nature and society activity. Folk societies have had exceptional experiences in relation to nature when they solved everyday problems. Folk wisdom/knowledge is an important component of local heritage and actual for the process of realizing local models of sustainable development. Anthropologists from Italy, Mexico, Russia and USA presented their views in the panel. The role of anthropological knowledge (folk wisdom, heritage) in the life of modern society was discussed in the panel. James Phillips examined the use of international law to preserve indigenous knowledge and associated cultures vital to confronting the environmental crisis. Aleksei Zagrebin analysed the role of youth in the process of transmission of heritage from generation to generation in the 21st century. Viacheslav Rudnev focused attention on negative changes in the environment (as a result of industrial pressing and climate changes) and searching a way to minimize risks on a base of using some nature using technologies of the Past.

Special attention was focused on comparative research of traditions in nature using in America and Europe and on a local interpretation of what sustainable development means for a modern society.

David Blundell analysed a process of revival of Tongva heritage (practices in cultivating native edible plants) in unlikely places such as the Los Angeles area (USA). Renata Freccero discussed the meaning of climate changes (limitation of water, strong frosts and spring storms) for pastoral habits among peoples of the Alpine area in Italy. Linda Davis-Stephens doing fieldwork among Cheynne-Tsistsistas familys (USA). Action anthropology assists to know more about the life trajectory of peoples in the past and now. Marina Martynova discussed environmental practices for creating a sustainable lifestyle. Now ecovillages are an important aspect of sustainability efforts in Russia. Susan Hascall discussed the influence of the fossil fuel industry in Texas politics. The Texas power grid is weak and unsustainable. Correcting the imbalance of power is important. Leslie Page focused attention on the problem of losing indigenous wisdom, erosion of indigenous knowledge in modern times. Indigenous wisdom, in many cases, has been supplanted by the overriding "western" view of the workd (through increasing access to digital media, satellite communication and increased interaction with peoples of different cultures through tourism and trade). Indigenous peoples have lost their traditional ecological knowledge and become part of the

market economy. Edward Sankowski and Betty Jean Harris focused on a re-interpretation of what sustainable development means. Edith Cervantes Trejo and Maria Elena Martinez-Torres discussed traditions of social reproduction in the Mayan community (Highlands of Chiapas, Mexico). Social reproduction based on patrilineal inheritance practices.

Lectures presented in the panel were devoted to problems actual for society and interesting for Anthropology science. Panel on Mapping Rural and Tribal Livelihoods and Quest for Sustainability in the Contemporary South Asian Societies" at the IUAES-WAU Congress 2024 worked under the auspices of the Commission on Indigenous Knowledge and Sustainable Development (IUAES) Result of the discussion is useful for future investigation and for teaching.







SCOPE

The study of different forms in which social and cultural divisiveness occurs has been at the core of much modern and contemporary social sciences and philosophy. Among those are processes such as social and cultural categorisation, identity construction, othering, ascription of hierarchically ordered values, xenophobia and marginalisation. In all instances they manifest in discrimination that sometimes deprecates, sometimes merely differentiates and sometimes exalts.

In the context of the contemporary global rise of identitarianism, socio-cultural divisiveness often intensifies extreme forms of discrimination. This makes scholarly examination of social and cultural divisiveness as, or possibly even more, important and relevant than it has been previously. The Commission for the Study of Difference, Discrimination and Marginalisation aims to foster academic debates and research that focuses on how and why those kinds of processes play out at all societal levels, from that of individuals through to more general socio-cultural and political economic life. It also aims to combine perspectives from a wide

range of different academic disciplines and scholarly traditions in order to achieve that goal. These goals derive from recognition that a broad, comparative and trans-disciplinary focus carries the potential to push debates into and between research fields that often remain discrete and detached from other research fields. The goal is thus to bridge what often remains a series of fragmented discussions and sets of research outcomes in order thereby to enable mutual insight across various otherwise disjointed fields.

The Commission's topics of academic interest include, but are not limited to:

- comparative examinations of different manifestations of divisiveness and discrimination and of the diverse forms they take;
- the processes in which human diversity becomes categorised (linguistically, socially, scientifically) and is attributed significance;
- the logic of socio-cultural categorisation and its hierarchisation, as well as how that relates to the political-economic structures that categorisation enables at different historical conjunctures;
- the transferability of terms used to describe and analyse historically specific examples of oppressive discrimination to other historical contexts, including consideration of the value and dangers of such transfer;
- the role of linguistic classificatory systems in socio-cultural categorisation and its hierarchisation;
- the development, sustenance and reproduction of identitarian thinking across history and both in individual life, such as in the development of essentialist thinking amongst children, and in broader social reproduction of identitarianism such as in the politics of oppression and in struggles to confront and resist oppression and misrecognition;
- the history and archaeology of earlier forms of human group divisiveness;
- the logic underpinning diverse forms of divisive and identitarian constructs and narratives;
- the contextual existential as well as the psychological consequences of socio-cultural categorisation including especially identitarian thinking;
- the role of identities in diverse life-changing situations and circumstances, particularly those in which divisiveness and socio-cultural discrimination ensues. Among them are migration, disease outbreaks, conflict, catastrophes, etcetera;
- discrimination, ethno-nationalism, racism, xenophobia, xenophilia and jingoistic patriotism, as well as identity-based oppression, and resistance to those;

- the relations between oppression (commonly associated with identitarianism), exploitation (associated with class-based divisions) and expropriation (associated with imperialism) as well as between strategies to overcome each of those in struggles to achieve restitution;
- the use of divisive identities as a historical and contemporary political tool: (i) to justify
 exploitation, expropriation and inequality and to sustain unjust political and economic
 structures; and (ii) to resist such exploitation, expropriation and inequality in efforts to
 overcome unjust structures and to institute political and economic systems based on
 principles of social justice;
- the relation between class positionality and class identity, and between each of those and other socio-cultural identities as well as between various different forms of socially constructed divisiveness and discriminatory practice;
- the tension between calls for identitarian recognition/affirmation and deconstruction (also often framed as a tension between identity politics/politics of difference demands for recognition and class-based struggles for redistribution);
- the political efficacy of identity politics over the short-, medium- and long-term and the consequences of its practice;
- the political and social-justice efficacy of strategies opposed to other forms of social divisiveness;
- the work done by identitarian thinking in situations of conflict and in processes of radicalisation that may result in extremism;
- intersections, clashes, and merging between political, economic, and socio-cultural forms of differentiation and value;
- relations between claims to justice made from various different standpoints, including claims to alternative forms of economic redistribution, to cultural recognition, and to rights to political participation;
- the neuro-biological and cognitive determinants (if any) of human classificatory systems and categorisation processes.

The commission strives to build on anthropological insights through a trans-disciplinary approach that includes widely diverse voices and perspectives and that generates novel perspectives and comprehension. To that end, the commission will go out of its way to encourage colleagues from the four fields of anthropology as well as from all fields of humanities, social sciences, philosophy, law and the arts, and from the biological and psychological sciences, to participate in its work. The commission also strives to foster a truly global debate, that allows not only trans-disciplinary but also cross-contextual comparisons that draw from local particularities.

The commission aims to sponsor panels and round tables and to meet regularly at academic congresses and conferences, as well as to organise independent seminars, meetings and — once solidly established — dedicated conferences of its own. The primary goal is to foster scholarly debate and exchange that will hopefully lead to publications. In addition, it is anticipated that the commission's work may ultimately also be useful to policy makers at all levels of society. All members of the commission are encouraged to propose events or other projects that are of interest to the commission.

History

This commission was established in 2018, at the IUAES Congress in Florianopolis, and has been led by Subhadra Channa and Faye Harrison. In that time the commission has been active at all IUAES congresses and conferences of other organisations, also organising independent meetings and events. In 2020 members of the commission published a special journal issue on essentialism. In May 2021 Jonatan Kurzwelly and Mugsy Spiegel stepped into the roles of convenors.

Whilst we know that PN18 and PN41 were both successfully held during the congress, it is unclear which of the remaining panels actually materialised. In large part that is because only one or two active SDDM members were in attendance and because the congress's inadequate time scheduling of panels, and the difficult to manage venue layout made it very difficult to attend panels. We also know that the contributions to PN41 are presently being compiled for publication under the auspices of the WCAA task team on anthropological values.

We must note that we were also informed by some SDDM members that the costs of participating in the congress were too high for them to register – in retrospect a good decision given the challenges of internet connectivity for congress participation, challenges exacerbated by the congress organisers' failure to maintain a proper time schedule.

Activities Organized by the Commission at the Upcoming WAU Congress 2025 (Guatemala)

PANELS

Various panels asserted, in their applications to the WAU2025 Congress, that they were affiliated (or co-affiliated) to SDDM. But none of their convenors had even attempted to contact the SDDM leadership prior to their making that assertion – a practice that appears, for some reason, to have arisen because of a demand of some kind from the congress

organisers that all panel proposals needed to indicate an affiliation with a commission. Moreover, without our being able to see the full panel abstracts, only four seemed even slightly concerned with the focus of SDDM as a commission. They are:

Apart from those panels, the Commission has been inactive during 2025, and, unless there is a successful attempt to revive it, that may continue for the remainder of 2025.

Publications

Following the 2023 publication of a special issue of *Dialectical Anthropology* that included revised version of papers presented at the 2022 IUAES Yucatan Congress (see SDDM report for 2023), the guest editors, two of SDDM's leaders plus another colleague, were invited to guest edit a *special collection* following up on the same theme. Various papers have been submitted, but so far none has reached the point of publication, and it seems that at most one or two will do so. The deadline for submission of contributions was February 2025.

General

Apart from having had WAU2024 panels affiliated to SDDM, and two of SDDM's former leaders having worked with various potential authors of papers for the special collection in *Dialectical Anthropology* that they were invited to co-guest edit, the commission, qua commission, was pretty much inactive during 2024 and has been also for the first half of 2025. In part that is because, as indicated above, all but one of the commission's steering committee's members are no longer active in the commission's administration. That means that it has fallen to just one person, Mugsy Spiegel, to have to maintain the commission — a challenge when much of the information about the commission was lost when the webpage was meant to be transferred from NomadIT to the present IUAES web administrator.

That said, a particular challenge for this commission in particular is that its focus is very broad, although its leaders have themselves had very much more focused concerns – as per the special issue of and special collection in *Dialectical Anthropology*. As the IUAES secretary general said at the time the commission was presented to a CoC meeting, SDDM's remit is pretty much everything that is understood as the concern of soio-cultural anthropology – a characteristic rather different from all other IUAES commissions most of which have a particular empirical focus.

While Anita Nudelman has been encouraging us to revitalise the commission by meeting and bringing on board convenors of panels for WAU2025 that have asserted affiliation to SDDM, that meeting has not yet occurred. Moreover, none of the presently listed SDDM leadership will be attending WAU2025. And it may be that SDDM has outlived its purpose as an IUAES commission and needs to be disestablished.

Interns

We are extremely grateful for the assistance we received from our IUAES intern, Elaheh Eslami who was appointed in 2024 and who put much effort into advertising the panels affiliated with SDDM for the WAU2024 Congress. She has since stepped down and been replaced by a very enthusiastic intern, Alive Somaguda, who has been very keen to assist with the revitalisation of the Commission, despite SDDM being in the doldrums.

Elections

The commission's work is steered and administered by a committee of at least three active members who are elected every two years. There is a cap of three consecutive times any individual member may continue to serve on the steering committee. All members are encouraged to propose their candidacy for the convenor roles.





Activities by the Commission during WAU Congress 2024 (South Africa)

At the World Anthropological Union Congress in Johannesburg, the young IUAES Commission of Digital Anthropology held a double-panel titled "Reimagining Digital: Towards Decolonial Perspectives and Practices", chaired by Leah Junck and Katrien Pype. The panel hosted 6 papers, each exploring how digital technologies intersect with social life in very distinct ways. The papers came from different places around the world, contributing for a wider dialogue about Anthropology. The presenters were: Piotr Cichocki, Jonathan Madeira Rocha, Daria Radchenko, Ksenia Glovina, Lallianpuii Lallianpuii and Cody Rodriguez.

One of the presenters saw the need to document spiritual practice in northern Malawi. Coproducing and publishing Vimbuza recordings, they saw themselves confronted with complex questions of cultural preservation and digital representation. In Northeast India, media producers from the Mizo community developed streaming apps to showcase local films. Their work directly confronted dominant narratives around platformization and algorithmic control, demonstrating how indigenous media can challenge the global hegemony of digital platforms. Research on the branding of "smart farming" in Brazil examined its portrayal as modern and sustainable, raising critical questions about the socioenvironmental impacts of this rapidly expanding practice.

Other projects explored the intricate dynamics between humans and technologies, thus providing crucial insight into how tech developers' visions become part of everyday practice and rituals. In Russia, families (including pets) interacting with Al-driven Roomba vacuum cleaners illustrated the depth to which technologies become part of domestic life, leading people to produce a whole new vernacular around these technologies.

Meanwhile, practices of Russian-speaking migrants in Japan taking screenshots at funerals of the deceased when taking part remotely and in real-time speaks to the evolving interplay between mobility, digital access and emotional rituals in a hyperconnected world. Finally, a researcher studying van life culture in the United States shared their experience of living full-time and mingling with other "van lifers", and illustrated what staying connected as a modern-day nomad looks like.

By foregrounding the meanings imbued in digital practices - or sometimes in conflict with them - these projects provide an idea of how digital anthropology can provide culturally nuanced perspectives. These insights are highly relevant in areas such as data rights, environmental justice, and digital inclusion, where context-specific understanding is essential for identifying and addressing unequal outcomes.

We would like to thank our panelists and the engaged audience for a fantastic learning experience. The presented projects provide crucial insights into how digital technologies shape everyday life, offering important lessons in areas like data rights, environmental sustainability, and cultural empowerment. We are currently in the process of compiling the panel contributions into a publication.



Lecture series: Anthropology across the Globe

Since January 2025, CoDA has been promoting the lecture series "Digital Anthropology Across the Globe". The idea behind the lecture series is to explore the emerging discipline of Digital Anthropology through a global lens. To that effect, we invited a series of speakers from different regions around the world to share their work and experiences working in the still emerging field.

The first lecture in this series took place in January, with Professor Carolina Parreiras (USP – Brazil) as our speaker. Her lecture was titled "Digital Inequalities in Brazilian Favelas: Reflections on Uses, Infrastructures, and Meaningful Connectivity." The recording can be found on our YouTube channel:



The second lecture was held in February, featuring Professor Jennifer Deger (Charles Darwin University). In her talk, she shared insights from her ongoing projects, focusing on "exploring the diverse voices and knowledgeS that intermedial 'writing' can bring together, even as digitally driven regimes of value and knowledge production impose their own brutalising forms of academic compliance and conservatism." Activities Organized by the Commission at the Upcoming WAU Congress 2025 (Guatemala)

As part of the WAU 2025 Congress, we will hold a panel titled "Dismantling rupture and tech determinism: Digital transformations and their impacts on social lives, media practices and economies". The abstract below outlines its intentions and it will likely be held as a double-panel.

"Events and innovations in the realm of technology and digitisation are typically framed as either moments of social rupture or as an inevitable trajectory that humans merely follow. But within these developments lie smaller-scaled, often overlooked disruptions—unanticipated shifts, gradual transitions, and entirely unscripted ways of doing things. How do people in different social contexts experience and respond to the tension between continuity and change? What drives resistance to transformation, and how do people navigate it? And what do people want change to look like - what do they want to preserve and what to alter? What alternative futures to those scratched out by an elite few are being imagined? Digital anthropology allows us to explore these questions - the social textures and everyday realities of living with technology—whether through social media and their latest AI add-ons, e-governance, or the environmental consequences of digital expansion. This panel invites us to look beyond grand narratives of rupture and technological determinism and get into the messiness of our digitally substantiated life worlds, into the imaginations of "change" (as transition, as rupture, etc.), and into the expectations regarding digital futures. We are particularly interested in papers that can be included in a special issue or edited volume on the topic."

WAU Panels and other Commission events

Our Commission was very successful at the WAU Congress held in Johannesburg, South Africa, in November 2024. It sponsored two full sessions with challenging presentations by scholars from the US, Brazil, and Russia (with field experience in the Middle East, Africa, Russia and South America). In addition, the Commission members attended and participated in discussion in adjacent panels (such as the one on friendship). The Commission also participated in the Council of Commissions meetings. A number of newcomers approached us about joining the Theoretical Anthropology Commission and having a panel on methods

as well as theory. In response, two Theoretical Anthropology panels were organized for the Congress of Anthropologists and Ethnologists of Russia (in Perm, July 2025) and for the next WAU Congress to be held in Antigua, Guatemala in November 2025. As a result of our very successful WAU 2024 meeting, the two panels organized for Perm and for Antigua have an extensive thematic diversity (one panel is on Kinship, a second one is on Ethnicity and third one is on Methods) and all three reached capacity. All presenters for the Antigua event are inperson.

Social media, networking and Commission growth

We established a social media presence in the form of an international mailing list of anthropologists who expressed interest in the Commission; there are dedicated Commission pages on X.com and Facebook, as well as a Facebook group (40 posts, 12 members) that discusses theoretical anthropology issues. The mailing list and the Facebook group have served as a way to expand our network of anthropologists and to keep them informed about upcoming events. We have posted on Facebook an archive of photos from past Commission events showing networking and presentational material activities at various IUAES meetings.

In addition, we have a that has served as the main communication vehicle for sharing thoughts and for organizing our panels for future meetings. We are in contact with WAU 2025 panel organizers affiliated with the Theoretical Anthropology Commission, some of whom participated with us at social events in Johannesburg in 2024.

In 2024-early 2025, the Commission leaders have attended several premier global events on Artificial Intelligence (in Saudi Arabia, US and Russia), thereby pioneering a new trend to include the burgeoning field of AI research and practice into the scope of Theoretical Anthropology. A full session tentatively entitled "Artificial Intelligence: A View from Anthropology" is being conceptualized for WAU 2026.

Output

Some of the papers presented to WAU 2024 are being reviewed for publication in the flagship Commission journal, Kinship. On the basis of input from the two sessions at WAU 2024, the Commission has published an updated version of the multi-disciplinary Integrated Bibliography of Kinship Studies on Academia.edu.




Planned Activities for 2025

For the year, 2024-2025, the Commission (CoAoR) was guided in all of its activities by Cochair, Daniela Calvo (Graduate School of Human and Environmental Studies, Kyoto University, Kyoto, Japan]). Co-chair Hanna Kim (Anthropology Department, Adelphi University, New York, USA) was absent due to personal reasons and returned to supporting the CoAoR, including attending Council of Commissions meetings, in mid spring 2025. The Commission's activities, in summary, included hosting membership zoom CoAoR meetings; posting information to the Facebook page of the Commission; working with the assigned social media intern (Vishal Kamath) to ensure a steady social media output; initiating a multicommission Photo Essay Contest project; ensuring very strong participation by members for the World Anthropology Union Congresses in South Africa (November 2024) and Guatemala (November 2025); collaborations among the commission's members for seminars and publications.

Andrea de Antoni (Kyoto University) organised the Symposium "Affecting Spiritual Healing, Re-making (alternative) worlds", Kyoto University (Kyoto, Japan), 7-8 December 2024, with presentations of CoAR members Andrea de Antoni, Ran Muratsu and Daniela Calvo, and the participation of other CoAR members.

Year of establishment: 2024

The principal goal of the IUAES Commission on Anthropological Publications (ICAP) is to disseminate anthropological work from around the world. It aims to facilitate, promote, and encourage the publication of articles and special sections in open access journals, in alignment with each journal's guidelines. ICAP also intends



to suggest principles and best practices for journal editors globally. The commission conducts research on the state of anthropological journals worldwide and complements the work of the Commission on Documentation. It also supports the WCAA's Council on Publishing by contributing research-based insights. The commission works collaboratively to address issues such as the unequal visibility of authors in academic journals, politics related to Open Access, and editorial processes. We plan to organize panels, workshops, and international conferences to highlight these challenges, with the intention of publishing the outcomes post-event. Its mission is to bring together underrepresented voices in national, regional, and global anthropologies—voices that have the potential to enrich knowledge production. This includes alternative theoretical approaches that have often been overlooked or excluded. The Commission published notes in every issue of the WAU newsletter.

This roundtable, held during the WAU Congress in South Africa, brought together editors and scholars to critically examine the consequences of academic journals transitioning from locally based publishers—often affiliated with universities—to major international publishing houses such as Elsevier, Wiley, Springer, and Taylor & Francis. The session was organized and chaired by Carmen Rial and Virginia Dominguez, and featured the participation of Greg Accioli, Taminder Kaur, Clara Saraiva, and Antonio Carlos de Souza Lima (who contributed via a pre-recorded video presentation).

Drawing on their experiences as journal editors, participants shared concerns about the loss of editorial discretion and increasing standardization of content. They emphasized how the growing emphasis on impact factors has pressured editors to prioritize submissions that align with mainstream topics and methodologies, often at the expense of diverse, regionally grounded, or experimental scholarship. The discussion addressed the systemic marginalization of Global South scholars, whose work may not conform to dominant academic trends or language expectations, and who often face barriers to publication in "high-impact" venues.

Participants noted that this transition has not only narrowed the scope of acceptable academic work, but also reinforced the dominance of Global North epistemologies. The roundtable served as a platform to reflect on strategies to resist this hegemony, such as maintaining independent or university-based journals, fostering multilingual publishing,

encouraging South-South editorial collaborations, and challenging metric-based evaluation systems.

Despite technical issues that prevented the originally scheduled hybrid format, the inperson discussion was dynamic and productive, with about 15 attendees contributing to a rich exchange of ideas. The roundtable concluded with a collective call to support more inclusive and plural academic publishing practices, and to assert editorial independence in the face of commercial and bureaucratic pressures.


Planned Activities for 2025

The Commission on Anthropological Publications is planning a new online panel for the 2025 WAU Congress, to be held from 3 to 5 November in Guatemala. The panel will be organized by Carmen Rial and Virginia R. Dominguez. Additionally, an in-person roundtable will take place at the AAA Congress, from 19 to 23 November in New Orleans, USA, also organized by Virginia R. Dominguez. The debate aims to foster a more inclusive, transparent, and ethically grounded approach to academic publishing. It will serve as an open space to exchange ideas, share challenges, and explore solutions for a more inclusive and sustainable academic publishing system. The panel invites editors of anthropological journals, peer reviewers, writers, and readers to join the discussion on good publishing practices and editorial experiences. It will bring together publishing professionals to debate best practices and the current challenges in scholarly publishing. Key topics include the impact of digital media, the rise of open access, the increasing strain on the peer review system due to the lack of proper incentives, the effects of Al-generated content, and the persistence of inequalities in global publishing—such as disparities in North-South participation in editorial boards and concerns over intellectual extractivism. Additionally, the discussion will explore issues related to paywalled research, the ethics of knowledge access, and strategies to ensure more equitable and sustainable publishing models.

Final Considerations

After a hesitant start, ICAP now has a new team working to disseminate news on social media: Livia Abdalla (INCT Futebol/UFSC) and Cristhian Caje (INCT Futebol/UFSC). They designed a new logo and have been increasingly active online, sharing updates about the WAU Congress and other ICAP initiatives. We plan to strengthen communication with ICAP members and launch an updated webpage on the IUAES website. We will also maintain close dialogue with the WCAA Council on Anthropological Publications.

- Advance Theoretical Inquiry: Engage with key thinkers such as Pierre Clastres, James C. Scott, David Graeber, Harold Barclay, and Eduardo Viveiros de Castro to promote critical discussions on anarchist anthropology.
- **Foster Transdisciplinary Dialogue**: Build spaces for exchange and collaboration between academics, activists, and communities across fields and borders.
- **Support Ethnographic and Historical Research**: Encourage studies that foreground stateless societies, informal economies, indigenous cosmologies, and everyday resistance.
- **Challenge Dominant Paradigms**: Interrogate state-centred analytical frameworks in the social sciences and foreground anti-authoritarian, anti-extractivist, and anti-capitalist perspectives.
- **Promote Ethical Methodologies**: Advocate for participatory, horizontal, and ethically committed research practices.
- **Engage with Contemporary Crises**: Apply anarchist perspectives to understand and respond to systemic inequality, social alienation, and environmental collapse.

Activities Organized by the Commission at the Upcoming WAU Congress 2025 (Guatemala)

The Commission successfully proposed and secured a panel at the upcoming WAU 2025 Conference, which will take place in Guatemala. The panel aims to bring together scholars working on anarchist anthropology, autonomy studies, and stateless forms of social organization, focusing on ethnographic and theoretical contributions.

Looking ahead, the Commission is preparing a series of initiatives to consolidate its international presence, expand collaborations with other IUAES commissions, and deepen theoretical and methodological discussions.

In 2026, the Commission will co-organize a webinar series in collaboration with other IUAES bodies, such as the Commission on Fieldwork and Innovative Methodologies. These events will explore intersections between anarchist approaches and emerging debates on governance, resistance, and research methods.

Public Outreach Live Session: Why Anarchist Anthropology?

To expand the Commission's membership and stimulate broader discussion, a live event will introduce the key questions and provocations of anarchist anthropology. The event will include short talks from current members, testimonials from researchers working in autonomous communities, and an open call for participation.

Opinion Article for the IUAES Newsletter

The Commission is drafting an opinion piece for publication in the IUAES newsletter. The article will articulate anarchist anthropology's theoretical relevance and political urgency, particularly in global governance crises, inequality, and ecological collapse.

Conclusion

The Commission on Anarchist Anthropology and Autonomy Studies was created in response to a growing demand for critical, non-hierarchical approaches within the anthropological field. In a short time, the Commission has established its presence through public engagement, scholarly collaboration, and programmatic activity. As we move into 2026, we aim to deepen our critical interventions, build meaningful alliances, and expand the role of anarchist perspectives in shaping anthropological thought and practice.

Commission on Migration

The Commission on Migration held elections in June, 2024. A new set of

co-chairs, Vinicius Kauê Ferreira and Leonardo Schiocchet, was elected in July for a period of four years. Their term began on July 1, 2024, and will continue until June 30, 2028. They were the only members to propose candidature and were elected unanimously.

The co-chairs consolidated goals for their present term (2024-2028) are:

- a. redefining the scope of the commission and naming it accordingly (the idea is to engage with much wider terms such as Dis/Emplacements, Fluxes, Encounters, Friction, and fragments; but not (im)mobility so as to not create a carboncopy of EASA's anthromob, with which we seek to collaborate closely)
- b. promoting in-depth reflection on the scope of our commission in order

to discuss forms of including a broader community of scholars and professionals involved with migration-related research;

- c. attracting new active members and enhancing the communication between the membership / continuing the expansion of the commission's membership as a way of increasing its relevance, representativity and diversity in global terms;
- d. developing sub-commissions based on topic and regions of interest, thereby creating a structure of feedback and relative autonomy to feed intellectual debate and institutional activity;
- e. establishing clearer rules regarding membership and the right to candidate and vote in elections in order to enhance our commission's governance and participation;
- f. hosting more collective initiatives proposed by our members, either in the context of the IUAES inter-congresses and beyond them; a) Helping to

identify ground-breaking research and showcase it through IUAES-related events b) Give space to younger scholars, scholars in precarious positions, and minorities and scholars situated in nonhegemonic institutional spaces.

g. consolidating the role of our commission as a public platform for public debate and qualified political intervention regarding public issues

Please describe how election procedures were

conducted democratically:

The Election was held electronically using MS Forms. Each voting member was given a unique voting code, which the voter was required to enter into the MS Form voting platform to enable each vote to be unique (i.e. only 1 vote per person) and

anonymised.

A nomination period was announced on the CNP list-serve, enabling individuals to self-nominate or be nominated by others. There was one nomination received for the Chair of the commission and three nominations received for the Deputy Chair. Each nominee included their CV and a letter explaining their motivation to run for the position and their planned contributions. These materials were shared with the voters.

Please list specific challenges faced in organizing this election:

The main challenge was that we have many members on our email list-serve but many are no longer active. Therefore, it was not possible to easily differentiate between active and non-active members. Due to this challenge, we opened the voting to all 171 people who were members of the list-serve.

Election Result Reporting Protocol (How have/will you report the results of the election to your members):

The results of the election were announced via email using our list-serve, which is the main method of communication utilised by the Commission.

Member List (for Executive Committee Records): We are not including this list due to GDPR restrictions and privacy laws in the UK, which do not allow us to disclose member's personal information to other groups.

Council of Commissions Manual

he intellectual heart of the IUAES lies in its scientific Commissions, whose scope expands and contracts along lines of topical interest, thematic specialization, and theoretical development. Presently, nearly thirty Commissions span the breadth of intradisciplinary and interdisciplinary concerns within anthropology. Over time, new Commissions are established whilst others have dissolved, regrouped around revised or extended in terms of shared interests or amalgamated with another Commission.

The Council of Commissions (hereafter CoC) represents all the IUAES Commissions which collectively are at the core of the IUAES chamber's academic activities. The CoC is a forum for discussion between Commission leaders and coordination of IUAES Commission activities. It is also a forum where Commission leaders' concerns can be surfaced and, through the CoC's Head and Deputy Head, brought to the attention of the IUAES's Executive Committee (EC) and thence to the WAU Steering Committee (SC). In addition, it is a forum where decisions taken by the IUAES EC and the WAU SC, and that concern the functioning of the Commissions, are reported and discussed. In that respect, the CoC constitutes an advisory body with representation, through the CoC's Head and Deputy Head, on the Executive Committee of the IUAES chamber within WAU and also on the WAU SC. The Head and Deputy Head of the CoC are elected by the CoC around the time of each quadrennial World Congress. Details of the election process can be found in the WAU Operational Guidelines and Rules (OGRs).

Responsibilities of the CoC

As the collectivity representing the interests of all the IUAES Commissions, the CoC is responsible for ensuring that the intellectual work undertaken in the name of the IUAES and its various Commissions is of a standard that brings credit and recognition to the IUAES and WAU. To that end, the CoC is responsible for

- enabling interaction between Commissions and their leaders in order to develop best practices within and between Commissions and their members
- ensuring that Commission leaders have opportunity for mutually assisting each other to achieve those best practices, including enabling early career anthropology and ethnology scholars from across the world to make significant contributions to knowledge that receive widespread recognition
- responding to initiatives from the IUAES EC, and making suggestions to the EC as regards initiatives and practices that will best serve the Commissions, collectively and individually, to achieve the goals of their intellectual activities

Responsibilities of Head and Deputy Head of the Council of Commissions

The Head and Deputy Head of the CoC represent the CoC on the IUAES EC and are responsible for facilitating the work of all IUAES Commissions, as led by their respective Commission leaders. The Head and Deputy Head are responsible for ensuring that the voices of Commission leaders — as expressed both through regular CoC meetings and through those leaders' direct communication to them — are heard clearly by the full membership of EC.

Their primary role is to advocate for the interests of Commissions as expressed through collective decisions of the CoC. To that end they are required regularly and, where necessary, on an urgent ad hoc basis, to

- ensure that a CoC meeting is convened during the time of each Congress and World Congress as well as at least once per quarter (more frequently if that is decided by a majority of CoC members); and also ensure that calls for agenda items are circulated to all CoC members no less than 14 days before such a scheduled CoC meeting. In instances where no agenda items are received by 7 days before such a scheduled meeting, that meeting may be cancelled, and its cancellation advertised to all members of the CoC as well as reported to the EC.
- ensure that a special CoC meeting is convened no more than 14 days after they have received a request and at least one agenda item for such a special CoC meeting from at least five (5) members of the CoC from different Commissions. Whenever a request has been received for a special CoC meeting, that fact must be reported immediately to the EC through the Secretary-General who will then be required to attend that special CoC meeting and, if necessary, to act as chair.
- ensure that minutes are taken at every CoC meeting and circulated to all members of the CoC within fourteen days of each such meeting; and that the minutes are tabled at the next EC meeting after the minutes have been compiled, as well as placed on the WAU webpage for general scrutiny by WAU members.
- keep the EC informed of any concerns regarding the IUAES and its functioning (including
 concerns regarding the functioning of the EC) that are raised by Commission leaders,
 whether through a CoC meeting or through direct communication. Such concerns
 include iniatives suggested by the CoC to enable its and Commissions' best functioning.
- keep the members of the CoC informed of any and all decisions taken by, and initiatives from the EC that may, in any way, influence the functioning of all or any one of the Commissions. Decisions regarding Congresses and their organisation are particularly important.

- ensure that there is close coordination between each and every Congress's scientific committee and the Commissions so that all panels proposed, and that fall within the field of an established Commission, are brought to the immediate attention of that Commission's leaders, along with contact details of those panels' respective convenors—so that those panels might be considered as sponsored or co-sponsored by that particular Commission.
- keep the EC and the general membership of the IUAES and of WAU informed of the
 activities of each and every Commission within no more than a month after
 Commission leaders have reported those activities to them.
- monitor the CoC listserv and respond substantively within no more than one week to any issues raised there by Commission leaders; and ensure that those issues are brought to the attention of the EC at its immediately next monthly meeting as well as to report the EC's responses back to the CoC (via the list-serv) directly thereafter.
- maintain good working relationships with all members of the CoC (that is all Commission leaders) and seek means to mediate when such relationships fail.
- organise to enable working meetings of all IUAES Commissions at or during each Congress.
- A secondary role of the Head and Deputy Head of the CoC is to facilitate a good working relationship between the CoC and both the EC and WAU's general membership. To that end they are required regularly to
- monitor the activities of the Commissions and to report on those to the EC, through the
 EC to WAU's SC, and also to all members of the WAU whether through Newsletters
 and/or the WAU website or other electronic communication media which all WAU
 members can readily access.
- notify all Commissions, well in advance, about all and every form of activity that is
 planned for a Congress or World Congress, to facilitate Commissions being able to
 participate actively in those activities; and repeatedly to encourage Commissions to do
 so.
- collect, edit into a common format, collate and publish all Commissions' annual reports and to ensure that they are readily accessible to all WAU members at the very least by publication on the WAU website.
- collect Commissions' quadrennial election reports, as well as any reports on interim elections which result in changes in Commission leadership; and publish those so that they are accessible to all WAU members at least by publication on the WAU website.
- ensure that the list of Commissions and their leaders that appears on the WAU website's Commissions page is updated within no more than two weeks of any change in Commission leadership having been reported to them.

- ensure that the CoC listserv is updated within no more than two weeks of any change in Commission leadership having been reported to them.
- monitor and report to one or more meetings of the CoC on the activities of any Commission that appears have become inactive or dormant; and, where that has been shown to be the case, to propose to the CoC that that Commission be declared defunct and that the CoC recommends to the EC (by a 50+1% majority vote during a quorate CoC meeting) that that Commission be disestablished and removed from the list of recognised IUAES Commissions.
- A division of labour between the CoC's Head and Deputy Head may be permitted but only if:
- it falls within rule VI,2,d,vii of WAU's Operational Guidelines and Rules which states that "Guided by the Secretary-General, the Head of the CoC shall be responsible for monitoring the activities of all IUAES Commissions, including obtaining and making available to all members of the WAU, in Newsletters and/or the WAU website or other electronic communication medium, annual reports on those activities."
- such a division of labour has been proposed to and accepted by a two thirds majority during a CoC meeting. Introducing or implementing such a division of labour is not in the remit of the EC; and
- the particularities of any division of labour are subsequently reported to a CoC meeting at least once a year, and their acceptability ratified by at least a 50% majority of that CoC meeting.

The Head and Deputy Head may, in consultation with the CoC, delegate various of the above and related tasks to subcommittees and/or task teams. Such delegation does not, however, relieve the Head and Deputy Head of their ultimate responsibility. Nonetheless, it is incumbent upon CoC members who have agreed to join any such subcommittee or task team to undertake all the tasks associated with such subcommittee or task team membership, to report accordingly to the Head, the Deputy Head and the CoC as a whole, and to recognise their responsibility in the interests of all the Commissions. Amongst such subcommittees there may be an advisory committee to assist the Head and Deputy Head in fulfilling their responsibilities.

Responsibilities of IUAES Commission leaders

Each Commission's chair and deputy chair (hereafter leaders) are primarily responsible for the productive intellectual activities of their Commission and the administrative and management processes needed to ensure that such intellectual productivity as well as regular and active exchange between Commission members occurs. The forms that such regular exchanges and the distribution of the outcomes of those intellectual activities take may differ from one Commission to another. Intellectual exchanges may be through means of conferences, seminars/webinars, symposia (including online), congress panels, workshops, etc. Outcomes may be distributed through publications, contributions to policy and/or to educational practices etc. In all instances, it is the responsibility of commission leaders to ensure that those activities and outcomes are explicitly associated with the Commission and thereby with the IUAES (and WAU).

A secondary but equally important responsibility is that each Commission's leaders maintain contact with the leaders of other Commissions – in order to foster mutual assistance, to organise collaborative intellectual activities (e.g. co-sponsorship of congress panels, cooperation on joint projects etc), and thereby to enhance the good standing of the IUAES and WAU. To this end, at least one leader of each Commission is expected to attend each CoC meeting or, if neither leader is available, to ask a proxy to attend and represent that Commission.

A third set of responsibilities, as spelled out in the WAU Operational Guidelines and Rules, is that Commission leaders

- maintain records of their Commission's members
- maintain and update records of all panels for congresses and other international conferences sponsored by the Commission as well as of all conferences, symposia, seminars etc, that the Commission sponsors and/or organises
- maintain and update records of all publications and any other forms of distribution of the outputs of the Commission's collective intellectual activities
- ensure that a democratic election of the Commission's leaders is held at least once every four years so that no individual occupies the same leadership office in the Commission for more than two consecutive four-year terms.
- complete and submit annual Commission reports in a timely manner.
- A final, but crucially important set of responsibilities is that Commission leaders, as members of the CoC, commit to ensuring the good functioning of the CoC by
- participating regularly in CoC meetings and inter-Commission activities; and
- agreeing to participate in and contribute actively to the work of CoC sub-committees and/or task teams.

Revisions of this Manual

Given that circumstances may change over time, this manual may be revised at any time by the CoC on the recommendation of the Head and Deputy Head or of at least five other CoC members each from a different Commission. At least once every four years, during the three months prior to a newly elected Head and Deputy Head taking office, this manual must be formally reconsidered and, if necessary, revised.
